Theatre Activities	College has been making significant strides towards promoting theatre activities in the campus. This year has been a very productive year in terms of showcasing the theatre skills of our staff and students. Several professional theatre troupes were invited to give a taste of the highest quality of performances. Our students also demonstrated their acting skills.
Research	Total 33 research project proposals submitted by the Post Graduate students are selected for financial assistance (Total Rs. 2,94,000/-) from Mangalore Jesuit Educational Society to do minor research project. Total 9 Teachers are applied for Seed money from Management for their Research Project. Out of 9 projects. 7 projects are recommended for the financial support after peer review. A grant of total Rs. 12.75 lakhs has been sanctioned by the management. 4 Staff members availed FIP Leave from the Management. Department of Science & Technology: has sanctioned a DST -FIST five year project (Fund for Improvement of S & T Infrastructure in Universities and Higher Educational Institutions) to our college on 16th January 2018 with a total cost of Rs. 95,00,000/- (Rupees Ninety Five Lakh only). Annual Progress Report along with Utilization Certificate and Statement of Expenditure has been submitted to Department of Science and Technology on 23th January 2020. Under the VGST scheme of RGS/F Dr Vishali Rai has been awarded Rs. 5,00,000 for the project entitled "Isolation and Characterization of Pigment producing Bacteria - An in vitro Study." in 2019-20. UGC- Scheme for Trans-disciplinary Research for India's Developing Economy (STRIDE) is sanctioned to the college for the project titled "Critical Assessment of the Origins, Evolution of the Cultural Diversities of Coastal Karnataka and their Impact on the Social, Political and religious Identities of the peoples of the Region" The project has coordinated by Dr Alwyn D'sa Under Mangalore University 12 PhD students are registered to English Department, 3 students are allotted to Chemistry department and one student registered to English Department, Three staff members are recognized as PhD Guides in Chemistry by Mangalore University. Five Research presentation were held in Social Sciences and Natural sciences during the year. CSIR-NET, UGC NET training classes are started for students. Environment	The Centre for Social Concern organized projects on Bore well recharging at two different places. The first project was held from 30th May to 6th June 2019 at a remote village named Byanalli, Mundgod and the second project was held from 29th - 30th June 2019 at Maanila-Peruvai, Bantwal. The first and major operation was to construct a Rain-Water harvesting pit in the village and sensitize village importance and judicious use of water. About 38 students of Sahaya team of SAC algary with Regitage (AFTONOMO)

Dionysius Vaz, SJ in association with 15 environmental activists of National Environment Care Federation (NECF) planted 450 saplings of various fruit-bearing trees to increase the green cover of the reserve forest area in Arasinamakki village in Belthangady taluk of DK district on 23rd June 2019. They planted mango, jackfruit, wild jackfruit, kokum, butter fruit and jamun saplings. On 6th of July 2019, plantation of vegetables and fruits saplings took place in St Joseph School Bajal, organized by NSS unit of St Aloysius (Autonomous) college Mangalore on account of Vanamahotsav. The inauguration and formal launching of the Annual theme, of the College SAVAYAVA-2019 was held on 8 July, 2019. The College engaged the staff and students in spreading awareness on including organic lifestyle. The year was observed as Savayava 2019-20. Various awareness programmes like seminars and workshops as well as activities related to the theme were organized during the year. A weeklong celebration of SAVAYAVA SAPTAHA was conducted. The yearlong activities on "Savayava - 2019" the focus areas of all the activities of the campus was formally inaugurated by Mr Swasthik Padma, one of the youngest innovators and inter-disciplinary researchers who has received accolades at the national and international levels. Attendance is uploaded on a daily basis by the teachers, which the parents can access. Mobile application SAC App is also launched for android users, through which attendance can be marked by the staff. Students and parents can use the app to view the attendance, marks scored in the examinations, submit staff feedback etc. All the blocks of the College have wiFi facility and so access to information has become a lot easier. College office uses the software developed for all internal purposes, generation of various kinds of reports. • The libraries are fully automated with EASYLIB library management software and the library catalogues are available online with EPAC facility. OPAC is also available in the library for browsing with sufficient terminals. To keep pace with the modern developments in the digital era, libraries have subscribed to 9 digital databases where thousands of ejournals are available online with full text with DELNET, NLIST, JGATE, PROQUEST, IEEE, CAPITALINE, NPTEL, McGRAW Hill NDL.

Every Class has a class guide and in turn mentors. Established Systems and Procedures • The Principal and the Finance Officer discusses with the Planning Committee and presents a report regarding physical, academic and support facilities in the Governing Body for approval and implementation. • The HODs, faculty, non-teaching staff and other service personnel are given responsibility to maintain the facilities under their supervision. They later report to the Principal for maintenance of infrastructure when needed. • An annual audit stock taking of the physical, academic and support facilities is undertaken for assessment and evaluation. • A detailed report is submitted by the Heads of the Departments to the Principal which aids in planning for the next academic year. Maintenance of Physical facilities • Maintenance Officers and Staff - The maintenance staffs under the supervision of maintenance officer are responsible for maintenance related to electrical and other repair work of the classrooms and the entire campus throughout the year. The Carpentry, painting etc. are out sourced and these works are carried out under the supervision of the Maintenance Officer. • Technical requirements and other infrastructure facilities are maintained regularly by separate technical maintenance team. The major repair works are carried out during summer vacation. • Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) for lifts, air-conditioners, generators, water purifiers and other equipment which are cleaned calibrated and maintained on a regular basis. Fire extinguishers and First Aid Kits are maintained regularly and their refilling is done before the date of expiry. Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) for Servers and Software are

also maintained on a regular basis, • The Support Staff - Cleaning and maintenance of class rooms, seminar halls, laboratories, staff rooms, library, Wash rooms, corridors and the College Campus are done regularly on a daily basis. • Outsourced Security Service - The security of the campus is maintained by the Outsourced Security Agency Guards since November 2019. • To ensure protection for staff students, CCTV cameras have been installed at Computer Laboratories, Corridors, near the gates and other vantage points. The College has well defined Management structure. It has a Management Committee comprising of The Provincial as the President of MJES and the Rector as the Vice President of the College. The Management Committee is a policy making body which periodically sets broad policies for the College regarding admissions, academic programmes and infrastructure development. They regularly review and evaluate the academic programmes, the administrative process, extension activities of the College. The Governing Body steers the organization Management System, its implementation and improvement. It meets once a year to review the academic and administrative functioning of the College. The Principal being the head of the Institution guides the College in academic progress, admissions, staff recruitment and other administrative matters. He is also the secretary of Governing body. The Registrar of the College monitors the evaluation process. He looks after the smooth functioning and conduct of the BOS, BOE, BOAE, Academic Council and the Governing Body meetings. The Finance Committee finalises the annual budget and monitors the effective utilization of funds. Academic Council of the College meets at least once a year to approve the Course Structure and policy Principal

matters recommended by the Board of Studies of different faculties. Every department of the College conducts BOS meetings yearly giving directions to the department in planning and executing programmes for the development of the department. The College has 6 Director and 13 Deans to help the Principal in the day to day administration. There are regular meetings of Directors, Deans, PG and UG Staff Councils. The College has a well planned academic calendar which is systematically implemented. There are special committees such as Admission Committee, Grievance Cell, Ladies Welfare Committee, Research Cell and Antiragging Cell. IQAC meets regularly to take stock of the programmes and gives guidelines to the departments in the implementation of the annual plan. IQAC Coordinator in consultation with the Principal coordinates different meetings of the administrative bodies. IQAC with NAAC conducts annual academic audit of the departments and associations. College constituted a Research Committee which monitors the research activities of both the staff and the students of the College. Feedback from different stakeholders is taken annually. The feedback is evaluated and constructive suggestions are implemented Every BOS has an industry representative who ensures that the syllabus designed by the department makes the student industry ready. PG departments send their students to different industries for their project work including Summer Internship.
